Tutorial 8 : Graphic Art

Step-by-step guide to learn how to create graphic art using liner pen and watercolour

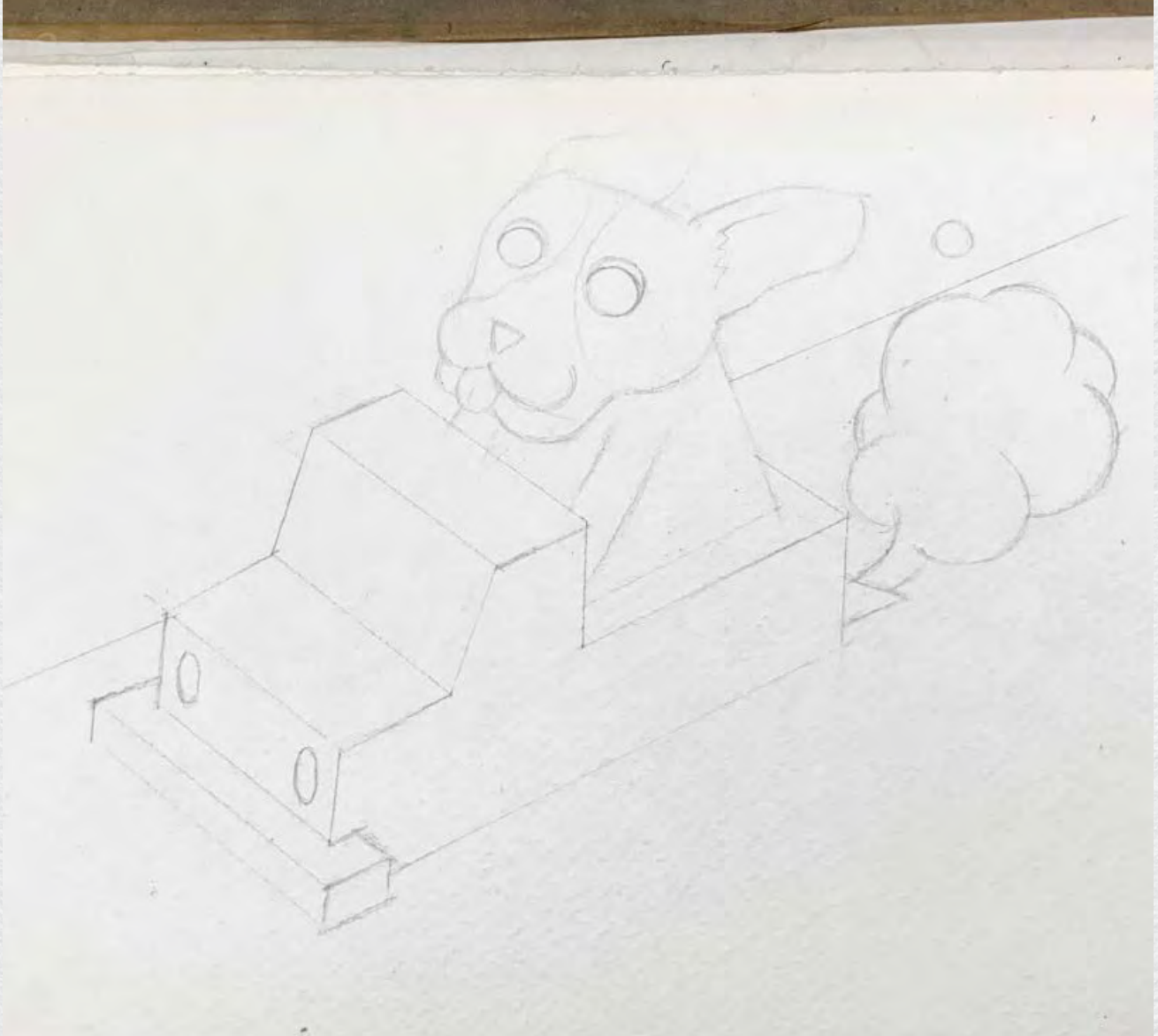
Materials: Paper, Pencil, Eraser, Ruler, Watercolours, Paintbrushes, Palette, Liner Pens, Marker Pens and Water



Sketch the outline of the dog.



Sketch the outline of the car using a ruler.



To create the car zooming by effect, draw smoke coming out from the exhaust pipe.



Prepare the watercolours.



Paint the dog using a lighter colour first. Layer with a darker shade to create the tone contrast.



Paint the car in brown.



Paint the smoke in grey. You may mix the black and white paint to create the colour.



Paint the background using slanted horizontal strokes in red, orange, yellow and brown. Paint the dog's tongue in red.



Paint the body of the car with a darker shade of brown and the headlights in yellow.



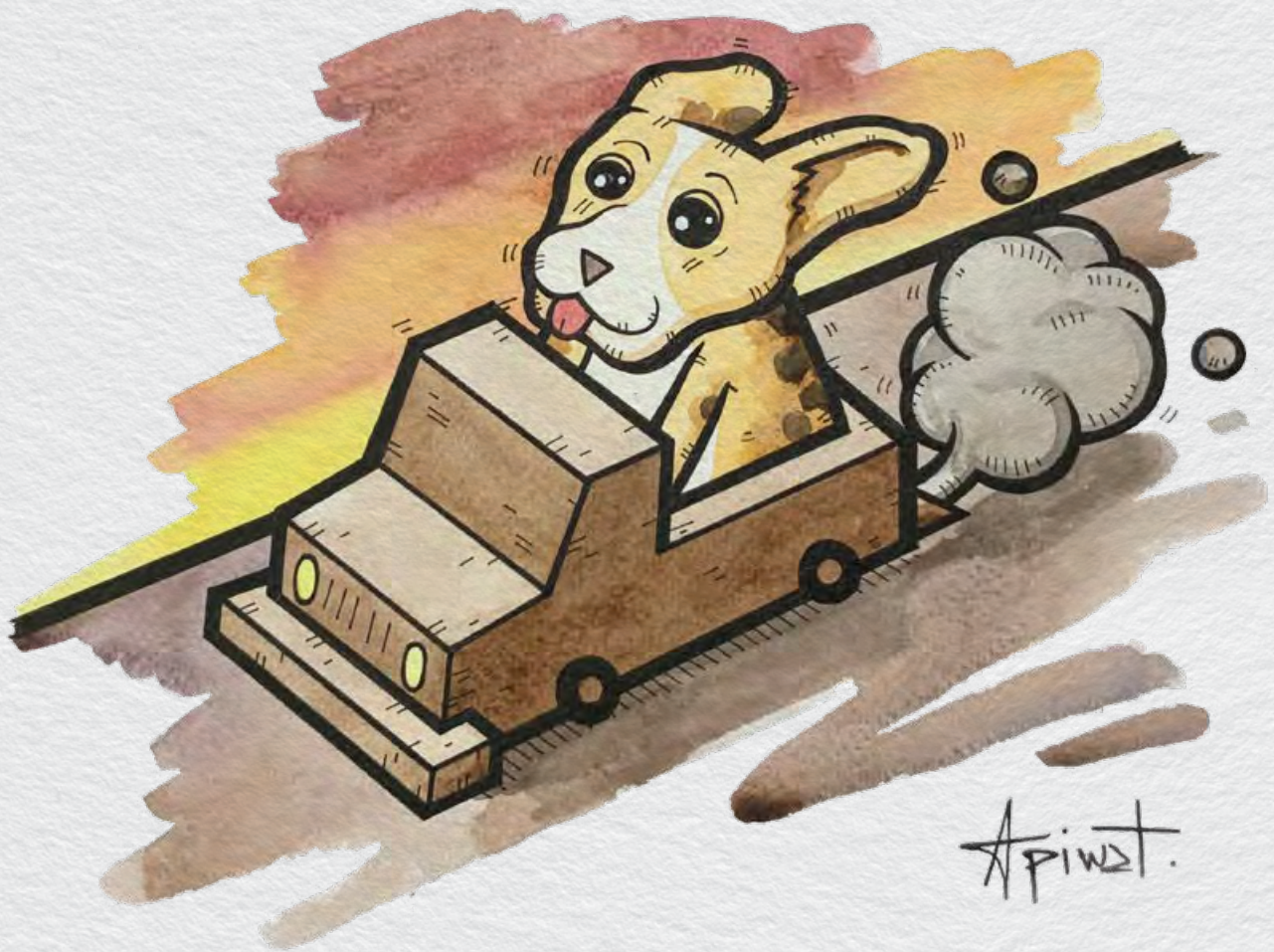
Use a black marker pen to outline the sketch.



Use a liner pen to outline the eyes.



Colour the eyes using the black liner pen.



Use the same technique to create other graphic art.

Three important tips:

- 1 Allow the paint to dry before applying another layer to create the tone contrast
- 2 Adjust the colour intensity of the paint by varying the amount of water added
- 3 Use paper towel to spread paint
